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A Letter from the **Superintendent**

In August 2018, the district launched a new comprehensive strategic plan aligned with current trends in education nationally, and designed to meet changing local demands. The vision for the district is based on seven strategic imperatives at the elementary and at the secondary level. The elementary plan is focused on core academic and social learning where the secondary plan priorities innovation, risk, and career trajectories. The strategic plan represents a collaborative approach by multiple committees and staff input over eighteen months of planning. It is a growth orientated model that seeks to leverage every opportunity to increase students' engagement and learning. However, as bold as the vision is, it must be supported by the commitment to robust resources to leverage the full potential of the vision.

With the new district plan at the center of the conversation, the school board approved a budget of 19.8 million dollars. With 19.3 million dollars in revenues, the district anticipates using slightly under half a million dollars of committed fund balance. A deficit of any amount is concerning. However, that number masks the concerted effort of the administration and the board to close the financial gaps and to maintain commitment to the strategic imperatives.

Driven by our strategic plan, students and staff will return to several new innovative programs this year. A few of those include:

- Dwight Woodley, Director of Innovative Learning, is launching pilot programs with iPads in select third and fourth grade classrooms and expanding the number of iPads available at Rommelt Elementary.
- Several new robotics programs will be available to students at the elementary and high school level thanks to grants provided by the Education Foundation.



- Central Elementary is expanding the impact of its Positive Behavior Intervention and Support program by adding additional layers of student supports and staff training.
- JR/SR High School will offer two courses through Penn College NOW affording more students the opportunity to earn college credit while in high school.

Despite the fiscal challenges, the board, administration, and staff are committed to a strategic plan focused on an innovative mindset, embracing risk as a learning opportunity, and leveraging technology as a learning tool for all. The community has much to be proud of in the past and in the future of its schools.

There are many administration changes across the South Williamsport Area School District regarding principals and assistant principals for the three buildings.

Upon the retirement of former Central Elementary School principal Kathy Furman and an unanticipated change in administrative staff this summer, Dr. Michele Loomis will be transitioning from being the assistant principal at the South Williamsport Area High School to the interim principal of Central and Rommelt Elementary.

"I've worked at the high school for 16 years so this will be something new for me," she said. "I'm excited for this change and working with the staff at Central and Rommelt."

She is especially excited to work closely with the district's Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports or PBIS program for the kindergarten through fourth graders. This program will be expanding to include more advanced supports for students in the form of a behavior interventionist and on-site mental health services.

Another initiative she is thrilled to be a part of is the student assistance program which includes staff working directly to support students in all areas. They help kids to develop good social skills which will benefit them for life.

At the high school, Scott Hill, former Title I math teacher, has taken on the position of assistant high school principal. He will also continue to fulfill his work as the district athletic director.

"Being at the high school full time...I hope to have more of an impact on the students," Mr. Hill said.

He and Jesse Smith, high school principal, have been friends for years and are excited to work side by side.

Each administrator is ready for the 2018-19 school year to begin and hopes it will be a great year for everyone in the district.

MOUNTIE QUEST – Supporting Students' Dreams



Special activities like playing in the school band or going to space camp can be the highlights of a students' educational journey. To make more of those opportunities available to South Williamsport Area School

District students, a new non-profit was created to help those experiencing financial difficulties.

Mountie Quest, which stands for Quality Experiences for Students, is an organization dedicated to financially supporting students who are looking to participate in a beneficial activity that could further their opportunity for success. The organization aims to ignite the spark that can help a South Williamsport student find their passion in life.

Pat Peltier, former district outreach counselor, and Jamie Mowrey, assistant business manager, worked together to start an organization that could give all students the opportunity to participate in something they are passionate about.

"We want to provide funding for kids so they can have formative experiences whether it's to register for the SATs, purchase athletic equipment or attend a summer theater camp," Ms. Peltier said.

Working in the district for 16 years, she discovered that students with access to broader experiences beyond the classroom can improve their self-confidence and help them to see the wide possibilities available for the future.

Any student can apply to receive funding from Mountie Quest as long as the activity they desire to participate in is formative to their development and success as an individual. Permission from a parent or guardian must be granted in order to receive funding. A formative experience can be related to academics, the arts, athletics, higher education opportunities and more.

"When students have access to broader experiences, they begin to develop resiliency and a better self-esteem," Ms. Peltier said. "Succeeding in special activities helps them to feel hopeful about their future."

The non-profit will provide a piece or all of the money for the student depending on what funds are available. The goal will always be to provide enough money to make a difference.

Alongside Ms. Peltier and Mrs. Mowrey, the board members include Fred Wood, former South guidance counselor and Dustin Solomon, '03 alum.

Mountie Quest is a 501(c)3 non-profit solely available to the students of the South Williamsport Area School District and Mountie Academy.

A GREAT BEGINNING for PBIS

The first semester using the Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) program at Central Elementary School was successful on instructing, rewarding and reteaching students about school-appropriate behavior.

The program created school-wide expectations for how students are to act in the classroom, hallways, cafeteria, on the playground and other areas in the building. Implementing common language and making the rules clear worked out wonderfully, Lisa Fisher, life skills teacher, said.

"The program kept students motivated and focused to follow school-wide expectations and do their best," she said.

One of the issues before PBIS was an inconsistency in how every student was supposed to behave. Using the same phrases and requiring the same behavior from everyone, it helped students to better understand how to act in school.

"When we are all on the same page, it sets our students up for success," she said. "When the expectations are known, it holds everyone accountable."

Using monthly school-wide incentives such as picnics outside, Winter Olympics and playing "Minute to Win It" encourages the students to be their best throughout the weeks so they can participate.

On a daily basis, students can receive shout outs, climb their classroom clip chart and get holes in their punch cards that

help them stay on task. Each classroom has a chart to display students' daily behavior, when they make positive choices they receive a punch in their card.

If faculty members see the students acting responsibly, they will give them shout outs that gets them a punch on their card.

Mrs. Fisher heard from a parent that her daughter's shout outs and completed punch cards helped them get through difficult mornings.

"On days when her daughter is not feeling her best and having a bad morning they get out the stack of shout outs to remind her of all the successes she has had," she said.

The student is reminded that, "no matter what the obstacle, she has proven that she can overcome it and make positive choices."

Similar to the January's PBIS kickoff assembly, there will be another one when school begins in the fall to teach new students and remind current ones.

"We are excited about our program spanning an entire school year and all the successes that will come from the consistency," Mrs. Fisher said.

She and the PBIS plan to create additional fun incentives for students and develop additional support for students who may require more intervention to succeed.











Shining Bright with MILLION MOUNTIE LIGHTS

Nominations are open to honor community members and students who have enhanced the lives of others through the South Williamsport Area School District's Million Mountie Lights Award.

Million Mountie Lights was created by school board members Cathy Bachman and Sue Bowman who wanted a way to showcase the citizens positively contributing to the school district and borough of South Williamsport.

Anyone can nominate either a South Williamsport community member, school faculty member, alumnus or student who is making a difference in a significant way. It is a way to shine light on the selfless work that often goes uncelebrated.

"Million Mountie Lights is a way for us to award all of the people in our community who don't get public recognition for the work they do and the lives they change," Ms. Bowman said.

Twice a year, December and May, the award committee, consisting of three board members and district superintendent Dr. Mark Stamm, will select five winners from the pool of nominees.

Some examples of what would qualify a person to be nominated are: making a significant financial donation to the education foundation, a group raising money for a community-enhancing project or a student who starts a charitable organization to benefit others. A nominee should be doing something that impacts the school district or the community, she said.

"There will be no shortage of good people in this community to celebrate with the award," Ms. Bachman said

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM JOINS SOUTH ATHLETICS PROGRAM

After existing as a club for six years, there will be an official South Williamsport cross country team competing this fall under the guidance of coach Matt DeBlander.

Since 2012 he advised the cross country club at the South Williamsport Area Junior-Senior High School with a small number of students participating. This past year the members were interested in competing at meets as a team rather than running as individuals.

"The students and their parents joined efforts before the school board to request for a cross country team," Mr. DeBlander said.

The board unanimously approved the proposal during the May 7 meeting.

The athletes who worked to make their dream a reality are excited to run together as a team and showcase their talents. At meets, high school students are expected to run five kilometers, 3.1 miles, while the junior high schoolers will run two miles along trails and grass.

"It's going to be tough for these young athletes, but they will have me and the rest of the team to support them through the challenges," he said. "I'm not going to leave anybody behind."

Mr. DeBlander is thrilled to encourage his new team to work together and put their best foot forward. He hopes to see each student accomplish their personal goals by the end of their first season.

WINTER WALKING PROGRAM

Beginning November 27, 2018, South Williamsport residents may use the high school building between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Monday through Friday for the purpose of exercise walking during regularly scheduled school days. The program will not be available on school vacation days or snow days. The winter walking program will run through the end of March. Children must be accompanied by an adult at all times. Entrance to the second floor for walking will be through the rear of the school at the cafeteria entrance. The parking area behind the school is well lit. Residents may contact the high school office at 570-326-2684 if there are any questions.

PROCEDURE FOR CLOSING SCHOOL

The decision to close schools or delay school openings for inclement weather, unsatisfactory heating conditions, epidemic, or other emergency conditions shall come from the office of the Superintendent of Schools.

IMPORTANT POINTS TO REMEMBER:

- In case of delayed school openings, buses will operate on a delayed schedule according to the period of time specified in the announcement. For example, should the opening of school be delayed two hours, buses will run two hours later, including parochial runs.
- Every attempt will be made to make delayed opening or closing decisions by 11:00 p.m. the night before or by 6:30 a.m. the day of school.
- Please inform your child of an alternate location for him/her to go in the event school is dismissed early and you are not home.
- The primary means of communicating closing information will be an automated phone call service. However, announcements will also be made through TV and Radio as a backup.

Mr. Samar will be present for the duration of the school day in case something serious happens. If there is an incident, big or small, he is there to respond immediately to keep everyone safe.


"You never know when you could have an incident," he said.

What is the Educational Improvement Tax Credit Program?

PA Act 4 of 2001 provides for the establishment of the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) to be administered by the Department of Community Development.

The Act authorizes the award of tax credits to businesses that make a contribution to educational improvement foundations like South Williamsport's. These foundations in turn may award scholarships or grants to support innovative educational programs. An innovative program is defined by the act as advanced academic or similar program that is not part of the regular academic program of a public school but that enhances the curriculum or academic program for the school.
