Superintendent's Annual Report



The district is entering the third year of its comprehensive five-year strategic plan. The plan merges national educational initiatives with local needs. Consisting of seven strategic imperatives, the elementary plan focuses on core

academic and social learning; whereas, the secondary plan prioritizes innovation, risk, and career pathways. In spite of difficult decisions, financial or otherwise, the district must remain fully committed to the vision for our schools: educating every child, to a very high level, in every classroom, every day.

In June, the school board approved a budget of \$19,743,963. With \$19,662,066 in revenues, the district anticipates using \$81,897 of committed fund balance. Every budget should be balanced. Unfortunately, that was not possible this year. At my recommendation, the board eliminated seven professional positions this year and one principal position. Those difficult decisions, along with other costsaving changes, enabled the district to reduce the initial deficit from over \$650,000 to just under \$82,000.

Controlling Costs and Reducing Expenditures

Multiple expenses were eliminated across the district from supplies, services, salaries, and staff. Among the many reductions, the larger savings included:

- From the professional staff, two economic furloughs of tenured teachers, the nonrenewal of three temporary professionals, and the elimination of two positions through attrition.
- From the administration, the elimination of a principal position and a voluntary pay freeze from all district administrators including the superintendent.
- From athletics, the elimination of fourteen paid coaching positions and a compensation freeze for all remaining coaching positions.

These decisions reduced the breadth of programs available for students and school supports for staff and families. However, the district is committed to providing diverse course and athletic options to students and ensuring that the needs of staff and our families are supported.

New and continuing financial Challenges

In recent years, South Williamsport, like public schools across Pennsylvania, is struggling to control primarily two increasing costs: mandatory employer contributions to the state retirement system (PSERS) and cyber charter school tuition. PSERS is a known cost, but until recently, the employer contribution of 34.3% of every salary dollar, was projected to decline. Much to our frustration it remained at the elevated rate. For comparison, in 2011-12 it was 8.65%. The disparities in this program are fixed in state law. Only the PA General Assembly can change this. Until then, public schools will continue to struggle to meet these obligations.

The other financial challenge the district is struggling to manage is tuition payments to cyber charter schools. Cyber charter schools advertise, "Tuition-free to families". In fact, the local school district pays the tuition directly to the cyber charter school for every child enrolled. Annual tuition for each enrolled child is \$11,351 (regular education) and \$20,615 (special education).

To attempt to control this cost and to meet the needs of families seeking a cyber-based education option, the district launched its own cyber program in January 2018: Mountie Academy (www.MountieAcademy.org) For comparison, tuition at Mountie Academy is \$5,000 annually, offers identical programing options as every other cyber charter school, and a South Williamsport diploma to graduates.

This year the district is projected to pay non-district cyber charter schools \$390,500. If all of these students transition their enrollment to Mountie Academy, the district will save \$245,500.

Keep Looking, Keep Learning

Despite making difficult decisions to reduce expenses, property taxes increased by 1.03 mills. The administration and board recognize that the district's budget cannot rely on increasing local taxes and I will continue to find opportunities to reduce expenses. In the coming months, the district will begin a more aggressive budget preparation strategy that seeks to not only balance the budget, but also begin rebuilding financial reserves while avoiding the reliance on local property taxes.

school dances. She is also an essential player on the South Williamsport Community Park Improvement Association which rebuilt the tennis courts and baseball field.

SCHOOL SAFETY



Our number one priority is safety. Ensuring that children and employees work and learn in secure and safe schools is foremost on the minds of district staff. A March 2018 report by the US Department of Justice, highlights the national concern; children attend, engage, and learn more when they feel safe.



Thankfully, across America, school violence has declined in the past decade; and just as importantly, the attention to school safety has increased.

The district Safety and Security Committee meets regularly to receive safety updates and provide advice to the school for enhancements and change to safety and security issues. Over the last year, those recommendations have included the installation of signage around district schools, the installation of secondary classroom door locks at all three facilities, and the installation of a new electronic door security access system. These security enhancements were largely funded through several grants the district received in 2018 and in 2019.

Looking into the coming school year, the district will continue to focus on proactive safety measures. The district's Emergency Management Plan, revised in January 2019, requires multiple student and staff emergency exercises during the school year including fire safety, bus safety, in addition to more serious incidents such as an active shooting on-campus.

Beyond the school day, parents and school visitors noticed the increased presence of school security. At the recommendation of the School Resource Officer, and following national best practices, the district increased the number of school security staff available and expanded the events that they monitor. The security staff also participated in multiple training programs this year including crowd safety, ALICE, and emergency medical care procedures. Look for individuals around our events, and please be sure to thank them for the work they do.

THE FUTURE OF —

Phase II of the South Williamsport Area School District's building feasibility study has come to a close. The project's stakeholders and board committee worked with McKissick Associates Architecture and Larson Design Group to collect data and create multiple options for the future of district facilities.

Together, the stakeholders and school board committee selected Option 2B out of the 11 options developed from Phase I data. This option entails closing Rommelt Elementary School, renovating the South Williamsport Area Jr/Sr High School and Central Elementary School. Central Elementary will also receive an addition to accommodate the fifth and sixth graders. Estimated cost for this project, which includes upgrades to the athletic resources, is between \$23 and \$26 million.

Both committees felt that Option 2B adequately addressed the mechanical, instructional and security needs of the district schools at a responsible cost. The committees held multiple meetings to review ideas, discuss options and make adjustments. "It was an exciting process to see community members and district staff work collaboratively towards this recommended plan," District Superintendent, Dr. Mark Stamm said.

The decision to close Rommelt was to maximize existing district space and reduce operating costs. "Rommelt is a fascinating old building with lots of character," Stamm said. "However, as an older building, it also poses the most challenges for the district in terms of accessibility, security and HVAC."

To accommodate for two additional grade levels at Central, five classrooms would be added on to the kindergarten wing

and a new multipurpose room would be built on adjacent to the current one. The library would be converted into classrooms, the music room will be the art room and the multipurpose room would turn into a library and maker space.

"The maker space will be an open learning area where students will focus on hands-on creation opportunities through science, technology, engineering and math," he said. This K-6 space gives students an area to test ideas and problem solve through coding, robotics, iPads and computers.

The high school library will be transformed into the Knowledge Commons, an open, collaborative space students and teachers can utilize outside of the traditional classroom setting, he said. This new space shows students what many environments are like outside of high school in work places and colleges.

The committees also plan to update the district's athletic facilities at the football and baseball fields. The football stadium will have a synthetic turf field, a refreshed scoreboard, reconfigured concession stands and the retaining walls will be replaced. The stadium will also be used by the school's soccer teams. The baseball and softball fields will also receive necessary upgrades with water, electricity and new scoreboards.

For Phase III, the school board will refine the financial impact, create a project timeline then present the final plan to share with the public during the Sept. 9 board meeting.

Some of the schools they will face are Juniata Valley, Shamokin, Sugar Valley Rural Charter School, Wellsboro, Sayre, Towanda and Northern Dauphin Christian School.

The number of students eating breakfast doubled this year due to the amazing success of the Breakfast in the Classroom program at Central and Rommelt elementary schools. In the fall of 2018, the district changed the breakfast





program from eating in the cafeteria before class to bringing breakfast directly to the students at their desks.

During the 2018-19 school year, an average of 253 elementary school students ate breakfast in the classroom daily which is a tremendous increase from the 122 average from last school year. A total of 43,768 breakfasts were served this year which is twice as many as the 21,439 served prior. Out of the 665 students in both schools, 38 percent participated in the breakfast program compared to 18 percent of the 676 student enrollment for 2017-18.

Each morning the cafeteria staff at the elementary schools make up coolers full of milk, juice, fruit and a main course for every student in each classroom. Breakfast can range from confetti pancakes, sticky buns or jelly-filled pastries. All breakfast foods follow the federal Healthy and Hunger Free Kids guidelines. After dropping off the coolers, teachers will ask each student whether they would like breakfast. Teachers check off the students' names which tell the cafeteria staff to charge their account.

Students eat at their desk with none of the worries that came with the previous system. Before students had to make sure they got to school early enough to eat in the cafeteria. This made it difficult if they were running late. They could miss breakfast entirely, leaving them hungry and unprepared for a day of learning.

Providing breakfast in the classroom alleviates any worries about being late to class. They get a half hour to eat before the school day officially begins at 8:45 a.m. Serving students the most important meal of the day ensures that everyone is ready to learn and work to the best of their abilities.

Hungry students often have trouble focusing in class and cannot fully process the important information in each lesson. Guaranteeing that students have this basic need met sets them up for a successful day of learning. Eating a healthy breakfast gives growing children the energy and nutrition needed to take on the challenges ahead of them every day.

The South Williamsport Area School District is thrilled at the increase of students eating breakfast every day. The cafeteria staff and supportive teachers have made this success possible. Thank you for your hard work to provide this necessary service for our students!

PROCEDURE FOR CLOSING SCHOOLS

The decision to close schools or delay school openings for inclement weather, unsatisfactory heating conditions, epidemic, or other emergency conditions shall come from the office of the Superintendent of Schools.

IMPORTANT POINTS TO REMEMBER:

- In case of delayed school openings, buses will operate on a delayed schedule according to the period of time specified in the announcement. For example, should the opening of school be delayed two hours, buses will run two hours later, including parochial runs.
- Every attempt will be made to make delayed opening or closing decisions by 8:00 p.m. the night before or by 5:30 a.m. the day of school.
- Please inform your child of an alternate location for him/her to go in the event school is dismissed early and you are not home.
- The primary means of communicating closing information will be an automated phone call service.
 However, announcements will also be made through TV and Radio as a backup.




MAJOR DISTRICT EXPENSES







